Please note that your literary history and English elective courses must cover American/U.S., British, and World literature from the lists in PAWS, and that since you will be expected to know Young Adult Literature, it is advisable to take LIT 310 Literature for Younger Readers as one of your English electives.

EED 450 Content Exam is a zero-credit, pass/fail course; if it is not passed on the first attempt, the student will be required to retake it in the fall of the senior year. Passing the exam is not a graduation requirement.

With careful planning, you may complete a minor in addition to your major. For example:

Please note that your literary history and English elective courses must cover American/U.S., British, and World literature from the lists in PAWS, and that since you will be expected to know Young Adult Literature, it is advisable to take LIT 310 Literature for Younger Readers as your second English elective (CWR 206 is your first).

For an English secondary education major with an associate's degree from a New Jersey community college (and thus no Liberal Learning requirement):

Under no circumstances may a student take two sections of LIT 499 in the same semester.</p>

The English major requires a total of 11 courses, including 3 Literary History (1 before 1660), LNG, and 2 English Electives. Within the Literary History and English Electives, at least one must be from each of the following categories, from the lists in PAWS: American/U.S., British/English, and World literature

The schedule above assumes that the student has taken two English literature courses at the community college. If no English courses have been transferred from the community college, an additional semester or summer/winter session courses will be required.

Semesters 3 and 4 can be exchanged, depending on when the students wants to complete her/his junior practicum semester, but we recommend taking EED 400 after or with the junior practicum.

EED 450 must be taken the spring before student teaching, so if you are able to arrange your schedule so that you graduate after 4 semesters, EED 450 must be taken in the second semester.
